
Volusia County Children and Families Advisory Board 2019 Stakeholder Survey Results

The online survey, designed by a CFAB committee, was launched on October 10, 2019 and closed on October 21, 2019. There were 83 responses.


Questions were posed regarding the current CFAB funded Service Categories:

Parents should not have to choose between paying for childcare or putting gas in their car to go to work or pay a utility bill. ALSO: There needs to be more afternoon/evening accessible childcare facilities for parents. Parents should not have to work split shifts and never see each other as a family, just to avoid the high cost of childcare. If there was evening childcare, both (or even one, single) parent could work a mid-shift or an overnight shift, such as a nurse or police, EMT, etc.

Adding agencies and expanding the participation in this app (which is just getting ready to launch) could be a valuable investment, as most parents of young children these days are much more electronically driven than in years past.
